STEP 2 CONTEXT AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

Context of the Plan:

The Economic Recovery Plan (ERP) will set out the actions that East Dunbartonshire Council (EDC) and its partners are currently undertaking to support the local economy through the Covid-19 crisis. It will also set out new actions for delivery in the medium-long term. The Plan will be relevant to Council employees, the voluntary sector groups/organisations, East Dunbartonshire residents, those who are working, studying or volunteering in the local authority area and visitors to the area.

Description of the Plan:

The Plan focuses on five key issues:

- 1. Businesses facing financial hardship we need to help businesses to access financial support.
- 2. Easing lockdown restrictions we need to support the reopening of businesses.
- 3. Job security we need to support people who have had their employment affected.
- 4. Local investment we need to prioritise the right projects to help our communities and economy to recover.
- 5. Changes to the economy and business practices we need to support businesses to embrace new modes of operation which have developed in response to lockdown conditions, and plan for sustainable and inclusive economic development in the future.

Overall the ERP will play an important role in updating the next iteration of the Economic Development Strategy (EDS) and will influence the development of the forthcoming Circular Economy Strategy (CES). It is anticipated that the content of the ERP, particularly the new actions proposed, will be iterated in both the updated and new CES, where appropriate.

What are the key components of the plan?

In addition to the 5 key areas above, the components of the ERP include a number of actions in support of each of these areas. These are listed in Step 3.

Have any of the components of the plan been considered in previous SEA work?

There are a number of components of the ERP that have been considered as part of previous SEA work. This includes relevant actions have been brought forward from Council PPPS including the Economic Development Strategy (EDS), Local Development Plan (LDP), Town Centre Strategies, City Deal, Place Plans and the Local Outcome Improvement Plan (LOIP). Furthermore, there are a number of initiatives outlined within Section 5 which have been informed by a number of practices carried out by the Council and its partners as well as actions within the Sustainability and Climate Change Framework (SCCF) and existing Carbon Management Plan (CMP). It is intended that the content of the ERP will inform any updated PPS where appropriate including the updated EDS, emerging Circular Economy Strategy (CES) and updated CMP. These will be subject to SEA and, as a result, any relevant components set out in the ERP will be considered as part of future SEA work.

Thank you for your Screening Report consultation which SEPA received via the Scottish Government SEA Gateway on 13 July 2020.

In accordance with Section 9(3) of the Environmental Assessment (Scotland) Act 2005 we have considered your screening report using the criteria set out in Schedule 2 for determining the likely significance of effects on the environment. Having reviewed the Screening Report, we consider that in respect of our main areas of interest (air, water, soil, human health, material assets (of which we have a specific interest in waste) and climatic factors) the plan is unlikely to have significant environmental effects. Although we are of the view that significant environmental effects are not likely, it is for the East Dunbartonshire Council as Responsible Authority to make a formal determination taking into account the consultation responses received.

If it is formally determined that SEA *is* required, you will be aware that the next stage requires the Responsible Authority to consult the Consultation Authorities on the proposed scope and level of detail to be included within the Environmental Report. This can be undertaken through preparation of a concise Scoping Report. We would encourage you to use the scoping process to focus the assessment on those SEA issues upon which there are likely to be significant environmental effects, to outline the baseline information you consider as most relevant and explain your proposed method of assessment. To assist with this process we have produced <u>SEA topic guidance</u> for those issues which fall within our remit. Further information on scoping can be found in the <u>Scottish Government SEA Guidance</u> (sections 3.4 to 3.8 in particular).

Screening Report

Thank you for your consultation which we received on 13 July 2020 about the above screening report. We have reviewed the screening report in our role as a Consultation Authority under the above Act, in accordance with the requirements of Section 9(3). In doing so we have used the criteria set out in Schedule 2 for determining the likely significance of the effects on the environment.

Historic Environment Scotland's view

In light of the information and reasoning set out within the screening report, we are content to agree with your view that there are unlikely to be significant environmental effects for the historic environment.

Historic Environment Scotland's comments

We understand that the Economic Recovery Plan will set out the council's response to the Covid-19 pandemic and how it intends to support economic recovery in the area. The components of the plan include financial support, easing of the lockdown, addressing job security, investing locally and supporting business through the changes to business operations as a result of the crisis. We note that you consider that, as much of this content will be informed by other PPPS that have been subject to SEA, significant environmental effects as a result of the plan itself are unlikely. As noted above we are content to agree with this view.

Specifically in relation to Key Issue 5 we note that you consider that, while the options set out in the ERP are unlikely to give rise to significant effects, there remains the potential for actions resulting from these options to result in such effects. We therefore welcome
