Town Centres

Concerns were raised about effect of parking charges on town centre footfall. Analysis in Kirkintilloch and Milngavie showed that footfall sustained following introduction of parking charges. 7. Continue to operate Pay & Display in offstreet car parks

9. Manage all Council car parks to ensure proper use 10. Suspend parking charges for key events and activities

11. Keep town centres clear to create people friendly environments

Five stations in East
Dunbartonshire have associated parking. Common concerns raised about capacity and effect on nearby residential streets prior to the pandemic.

Schools

37% of pupils driven at least part of the way to school in East Dunbartonshire. Major safety concerns for parents due to the volume and nature of parked vehicles outside schools.
