Introduction

This brochure provides details of East Dunbartonshire Joint Learning and Development Subgroup courses designed to assist individual agencies to meet their responsibility in respect of protection process of both children and adults.

Multi-agency training enables staff to work effectively both within their own agency and across organisational boundaries. Training people together can make a significant contribution to building mutually respectful and trusting relationships, which forms the foundation of any partnership working.

All training aims to achieve:

- A shared understanding of roles and responsibilities
- Improved communication between professionals and others working with adults, children, young people and families
- Improved assessment, analysis and decision making
- Improved effective working together based on sound working relationships.

Levels of Training

In order to meet the differing levels of training needs across the range of agencies and staff roles, the courses are targeted according to the level of contact with adults, children and families and level of responsibility.



Child Protection Committee Child Protection- General Level



Staff Group: All staff working in settings who may be in infrequent contact with children, young people and/or parents/carers who may become aware of possible abuse or neglect. This includes: reception staff, janitors, ancillary staff in all setting, school dinner workers, school crossing patrols, refuse collectors etc.

Aims: To develop a workforce that is aware of individual and collective roles and responsibilities regarding child protection, and has the appropriate skills and confidence to respond to child protection concerns in line with their job function and the National Child Protection Learning and Development Framework 2012.

- Describe what children & young people want and need to feel safe.
- Demonstrate how values and attitudes can affect our responses.
- Recognise the signs and indicators that may raise CP concerns.
- State how to respond to CP concerns using agency policy and procedures.
- Identify legislation and national guidance relating to Child Protection.

Child Protection Committee Child Protection- Specific Level



Staff Group: all staff working with children, young people and/or their parents/carers and who could potentially contribute to assessing, planning, intervening and evaluating the needs of a child or young person and parenting capacity where there are child protection concerns. This does not need to be regular work. Examples of workers include principal teachers, senior early years workers, Community Police Officers, family & adult support workers, youth justice workers, drug & alcohol workers, some housing workers etc.

Aims: To develop a workforce that is aware of individual and collective roles and responsibilities regarding child protection, and has the appropriate skills and confidence to respond to child protection concerns in line with their job function and the National Child Protection Learning and Development Framework 2012.

- Demonstrate professional knowledge and understanding of what constitutes significant harm and how to identify signs of abuse
- Explain the factors that might affect recognition of harm particularly when working with resistance or disguised compliance
- Identify how to work together to facilitate effective information sharing in order to analyse and understand potential risk of harm
- Increased awareness of the importance of professional challenge within a safe system and how to work with professional differences

Child Protection Committee CALA e-learning ZONE Think You Know Neglect



Staff Group: All staff working with children, young people and/or their parents/carers and who could potentially contribute to assessing, planning, intervening and evaluating the needs of a child or young person and parenting capacity where there are child protection concerns.

Aim: The module is a mixed media presentation which will guide you through key messages in a clear, straightforward and interesting way. Video and audio are used to explain and illustrate important learning points to help you understand more about child neglect.

- The importance of giving children a voice to help ensure the right help gets to them and their family.

Child Protection Committee Neglect Assessment of Care



Staff Group: Childcare practitioners across all sectors including Social Work, Education, Police, Health and Housing in statutory, voluntary and private sectors who may have contact with children affected by Neglect.

Aim: This course will be informed throughout by up to date research, theory, law, guidance and learning from relevant public enquiries and serious case reviews on childhood neglect. Participants will begin to recognise the damaging long term effect of neglect on children by beginning to develop an understanding of the support required to address family, environmental and structural factors that can affect the parenting capacity.

- Understanding of neglect from a multi-agency perspective
- Insight into neglect and Significant Case Reviews
- Knowledge of how to recognise neglect and it's impact on children
- Insight of how to assess neglect and parenting capacity
- Skills to plan effective interventions and measure outcomes

Child Protection Committee Domestic Abuse E-Learning Domestic Abuse Awareness Raising Tool (daart)



Staff Group: Practitioners across all sectors including Social Work, Education, Police, Health, Housing, Voluntary and Private Sectors who may have contact with children, young people & families affected by domestic abuse.

Aim: SafeLives has designed this e-learning with support from the Scottish Government and input from a number of specialist domestic abuse and mainstream services from across Scotland.

The online tool is intended as a learning resource for professionals. It is an awareness-raising resource and serves as an introduction to domestic abuse and coercive control. The tool provides an overview of the main considerations when responding to domestic abuse, however it does not replace specialist domestic abuse training.

Child Protection Committee Domestic Abuse - Children and Young People



Staff Group: Practitioners across all sectors including Social Work, Education, Police, Housing and Health in statutory, voluntary and private sectors who may have contact with children and young people affected by domestic abuse.

Aim: Understanding of how children and young people experience domestic abuse, through theory and research Knowledge of how domestic abuse impacts on the child's relationship with the abusing parent and the non-abusing parent. How you can support children and young people experiencing domestic abuse.

- Identify the impact of domestic abuse on parenting capacity.
- Link the effects of domestic abuse on a child's welfare and development.
- Use relevant knowledge in effective engagement with families where domestic abuse is an issue
- Have increased knowledge about how to signpost women and children affected by domestic abuse to appropriate services

Child Protection Committee 'Domestic Abuse Awareness and MARAC'



Staff Group: Childcare practitioners across all sectors including Social Work, Education, Police, Housing and Health in statutory, voluntary and private sectors who may have contact with children affected by domestic abuse.

Aim: To increase awareness of the different forms of domestic abuse and its impact on women and children. To raise awareness of domestic abuse risk and the role that the East Dunbartonshire MARAC (Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference) plays in protecting women. To inform practitioners how to arrange for risk assessments to take place and how to make referrals to the East Dunbartonshire MARAC.

- Have an increased awareness of domestic abuse
- Understand what the MARAC process consists of and its relevance to other public protection forums
- Know what a risk assessment checklist consists of and how to arrange for one to be carried out
- Have increased knowledge about how to signpost women and children affected by domestic abuse to appropriate services

Child Protection Committee Domestic Abuse: Child Protection & Working with Perpetrators Protection & Protec

Staff Group: Children & Families Services workers and managers including social workers, health visitors and support staff. Criminal justice Social Workers, Education staff and voluntary organisations working with children, young people and adults directly affected by domestic abuse

Aim: There is growing awareness of domestic abuse as a significant risk factor in Child Protection work. New evidence based approaches to work with male perpetrators are being developed which span Criminal Justice and Children and Families services to consider the context of the whole family through multi-agency practice.

This session aims to explore multi-agency practice approaches drawing on best practice evidence and legislation.

- Identify the key issues in terms of impact of domestic violence on children
- Understand how work with male perpetrators forms an important but often neglected component of the child protection plan
- Understand best practice in the risk assessment of male perpetrators of gender based violence
- Examine intervention approaches in working with male perpetrators through the criminal justice setting
- Consider how legislation can assist in the child protection plan and, in turn, can help protect children

Staff Group: All staff working with children, young people and/or their parents/carers and who could potentially contribute to assessing, planning, intervening and evaluating the needs of a child or young person and parenting capacity where there are child protection concerns.

Aim: This module provides an introduction to the subject of Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE); which is a form of child abuse. Sadly CSE is a significant issue for children and young people in the UK and is more prevalent and widespread than you may think. This is in part due to the ever growing use of technology in our communications. This module is therefore highly relevant for anyone working with children, young people and families and will provide a comprehensive introduction to this challenging subject. CSE is not just something that 'other' communities have to deal with, but could well be happening to children and young people that you know.

Aim: Responding to child victims of modern slavery presents unique challenges for practitioners working on the frontline. The Home Office has created a free e-learning module for First Responders, which is available on the Modern Slavery and Organised Immigration Crime (MSOIC) Unit website. All First Responders are encouraged to complete the training. The module can also be accessed for free by non-First Responders.

Child Protection Committee Early Protected Messages



Staff Group: Practitioners across all sectors including Social Work, Education, Police, Housing and Health in statutory, voluntary and private sectors working directly with children and their families and carers.

Aim: Early Protective Messages (EPM) is an approach used by staff teams working with young children and their families and carers. It helps to build knowledge and confidence to deliver key messages to children on gender, consent and language. The use of correct terminology for body parts, including the genitals, is required as this is essential when delivering early consent messages. Working alongside parents and carers, it is important to ensure continuous and consistent messages are delivered to children from everyone involved in their lives and attending this briefing session supports this.

Child Protection Committee Lessons Learned Briefing

Reviewing professional practice, alongside personal reflection, allows for the identification of learning and best practice. Reviews can range from case audits through to lessons learned and significant case reviews (SCRs) and can be undertaken using a range of methodology. However the purpose is the same, to identify how to achieve the best outcomes for children and young people.

The briefing summarises and highlights key learning points from Significant Case Reviews (SCRs) with focus on the way in which organisations or professionals work together to protect children.

- A summary of learning from multi-agency reviews
- Awareness of specific themes
- Knowledge of Early Help approach to improve practice and outcomes

Adult Support and Protection – Level 2 "Advanced Awareness" Multi-agency Training

Protecting Adults In EAST DUNBARTONSHIRE

Staff Group: Supervisors, managers and other professionals working in health and social care services and other relevant organisations who require to make decisions on the reporting of adult protection concerns, which may include giving advice to staff who report concerns and managing situations internally where concerns are raised. This is expected to include supervisors of care at home, day support and residential services as well as allied health professionals and nursing/health staff operating in a variety of settings.

Aim: To improve your knowledge and effective application of Adult Support and Protection legislation and procedures on a multiagency basis, in order to support and protect adults at risk.

Requirement: Pre-course reading and two MSTeams sessions one week apart.

- Describe 6 of the 8 principles of the Act
- Define the 3 aspects of "adult at risk"
- Define "harm" and possible signs of harm

Adult Protection Committee Case Chronologies for ASP & RAMP



Staff Group: Adult Social Work fieldwork staff and HSCP managers with responsibilities for managing cases under ASP and RAMP procedures

Aim: To improve or consolidate social workers' knowledge and practice in preparing case chronologies for adults at risk, in line with the ASP inspection recommendation from the Care Inspectorate.

Requirements: Offline reading and exercises and one MSTeams session. Participants must complete offline reading and exercises before and after the online session.

Objectives: by the end of the course you will have assured yourself that you have the knowledge and skills to:

- Describe the key features of a competent case chronology
- Identify relevant information to include in an up-to-date chronology
- Analyse patterns of behaviour and intervention
- Identify staff and management recording responsibilities
- Contribute to local good practice guidance

Adult Protection Committee Risk Assessment, Analysis & Management in Adult Services



Staff Group: All staff and managers who may be required to assess and manage adults at risk, or contribute to the risk assessment process or protection plan.

Aims: To enable workers to improve their competence and confidence in carrying out risk assessments, and implementing and monitoring ASP and RAMP protection plans

Requirements: Offline reading and exercises and one MSTeams session. Delegates must complete offline reading and exercises in addition to the online sessions.

Objectives:: by the end of the session you will:

- Understand concepts around risk and how models of risk assessment are reflected in the risk assessment tools you use in practice
- Reflect on the value of chronologies in assessing risk
- Feel more confident in undertaking risk assessments and risk analysis with the adult, and accounting for your decisionmaking
- Feel more confident in managing differences in thresholds between agencies
- Know how to use the risk assessment to inform an outcome-focussed protection plan
- Understand how the protection plan supports ongoing risk management

Adult Protection Committee Adult Support and Protection: Level 3 "Council Officers"



Staff Group: This legislation course is part of the mandatory training programme for Council Officers (i.e. qualified social workers, nursing and OT staff employed by the Council) and their managers within the HSCP.

Aim: To ensure practitioners and managers understand and can carry out their statutory duties and powers under the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007

Requirements: Offline reading and exercises and three MS Teams sessions over two days. Delegates must complete offline reading and exercises before and between the online sessions.

Objectives: : by the end of the course you will have had the opportunity to -

- Appreciate two key drivers leading to the Act
- Analyse the principles of the Act
- Define the 3 aspects of the "adult at risk of harm"
- Define "harm" and possible signs of harm
- Describe the purpose of the investigatory powers and Protection Orders
- Describe the 3 forms of "undue pressure"
- Build confidence implementing the 2007 Act with partners in East Dunbartonshire
- Consider when it may be appropriate to take action under another statute, such as the Adults with Incapacity Act 2000 or the Mental Health (Care & Treatment) Act 2003

Adult Protection Committee Adult Support and Protection – Level 3 Social Work Training Inquiry and Investigation



Staff Group: This skills development course is part of the mandatory training programme for **Council Officers** (i.e. qualified social workers, nursing and OT staff employed by the Council).

Aim: To further prepare staff to make inquiries under the 2007 Act, to interview adults at risk and to consider how Protection Orders might be used.

Requirements: This course involves a Face to Face session in addition to webinars – 2 days in total

Objectives: by the end of the session you will be able to:

- Describe the principles of the Act and apply definitions of "adult at risk" and of "harm" in different case scenarios
- Evidence skill in making inquiries into a referral of adults at risk of harm
- Prepare for an investigative interview
- Conduct and record an investigative interview
- Competently describe the powers and duties of the three Protection Orders

Adult Protection Committee Adult Support and Protection - Level 3 Practice and Procedures



Staff Group: Adult Social Work fieldwork staff and HSCP managers with responsibilities for Adult Protection inquiries, investigations, risk assessments, case conferences, protection plans and orders.

Aim: To improve workers' confidence and competence in the practice of supporting and protecting adults at risk of harm. .

The session aims to be as participative as possible, and will involve significant time to examine real-life cases with the practitioners involved.

Objectives: by the end of the session you will have:

- an improved understanding of how EDC Social Work Adult Protection procedures support your practice in this area
