Council budget secures jobs and services

In February the Council agreed a range of measures to deliver £11.3m savings for 2017/18 with a 3% increase in Council Tax and with no enforced job losses or service reductions.

The Council is facing its largest ever funding gap of £11.3m for 2017/18 having already reduced its budget by £53m over the past 10 years and by £32m in this current five year Council term.

The budget was balanced using a three-way approach:

capital investment programme for major asset and spend to save projects; transformation programme to deliver efficiencies; and savings proposals to the revenue budget.

Chief Executive, Gerry Cornes, said, "We will continue to deliver new state-of-the-art schools, new Community Hubs and town centre improvements while protecting vital services, including the Positive Achievements project which supports vulnerable young people.

We are also introducing Snack and Play schemes in priority Place localities, breakfast clubs and are reviewing our Additional Support Needs service for schools. The budget also included settlement for the remaining Equal Pay claims."

A 3% Council Tax increase will deliver additional income of almost £1.8m. For people in Band D properties that means an increase from £1,141.85 to £1,176.11 — a rise of £34.26 per year.

Residents should also

be aware that the Scottish Government has introduced an increase in Council Tax on all Band E to H properties across Scotland – in addition to any local rises. Properties in Band E to H will therefore see significant increases to their Council Tax bills for the coming year, ranging from an additional £104 for Band E to £513 for Band H as a result of the Scottish Government increase and before the Council agreed 3% rise is applied.

Multi-million pound schools project steams ahead

With two new schools about to open and work getting underway on another, this Spring edition of edlife contains a bumper round-up of the Council's Primary School Improvement Programme:

- In Bishopbriggs the last brick was laid at the new £12.4m Thomas Muir Primary School and Cleddens Early Learning & Childcare Centre (CEL&CC). Pupils are looking forward to the building opening after the Easter holidays. It will replace Woodhill Primary and Auchinairn Primary with CEL&CC now being part of the school campus.
- In Kirkintilloch brickwork was also finished at the new £8.7m Holy Trinity Primary which is being built to replace St. Flannan's Primary and St. Agatha's Primary. It will also open after Easter much to the excitement of pupils, parents and staff of both schools.
- In Lenzie at the start of March, the finishing touches were put to all the external areas of the new Lenzie Meadow Primary which opened in August. With the Lenzie Moss building cleared, landscaping, playground and outdoor sports areas at the new school are now complete.





 In Bearsden, earthworks began to prepare the site of the new school being built to replace St. Andrew's Primary and St. Primary in Milngavie. Construction will get underway later in the spring with the £10m new school expected to open in 2018. It will bring the tally of new schools to five since April 2015.

Chief Education Officer, Jacqui MacDonald said, "When Holy Trinity Primary and Thomas Primary open their doors after the Easter holidays hundreds of pupils will have the opportunity to learn in a modern, top quality environment suited to the demands of Curriculum for Excellence. They will enjoy surroundings that feature flexible indoor and outdoor learning areas, top end technology





as well as bright décor and attractive fixtures and fittings."

Gabriel White (P7), Chair of the Pupil Council at Lenzie Meadow, said, "All the boys and girls have settled well into Lenzie Meadow and we have loved making new friends. It is really good to get more space in the outdoor areas. I know the pupils are looking forward to using the pitches daily and we are excited about all of the different

opportunities we will be given to learn new things, using the outdoor environment."

Work starts at Bishopbriggs War Memorial Hall



Work has started on the £1.1m project to transform Bishopbriggs War Memorial Hall.

Construction work to extensively upgrade the facility began on Monday 13 February and is set to run for completion at the end of April.

The work will involve a full refurbishment to the main and lesser hall, a new kitchen, fully refurbished toilets throughout

and general repairs and upgrades to the outside of the building.

Following the £1.1m internal refurbishment of the Bishopbriggs Memorial Hall, library services and the Temporary Hub will operate from the building as work begins on the £2m Hub development. This will involve enhancing the current library facilities through a full refurbishment and upgrade of the current accommodation.

Thomas Glen, Depute Chief Executive – Place, Neighbourhood & Corporate Assets at East Dunbartonshire Council, said,

Use your loaf

Recycle your food waste

"Recycling has made me more conscious about how much food we waste, and I'm now careful about only buying what my family needs. I used to buy multi-packs because they were cheaper, but I ended up just throwing a lot of it into the bin."

The amount of waste being thrown into domestic bins in East Dunbartonshire could be drastically reduced if more residents used the weekly food recycling service.

Around a third of rubbish being chucked into grey residual bins across the region is made up of food waste, which emits harmful methane gas once it breaks down in landfill sites.

A campaign to encourage residents to use the free service has now been launched by East Dunbartonshire Council. Colourful leaflets explaining what can and can't be recycled will be posted through letterboxes over the next couple of weeks, along with a supply of food bin liners.



The average household which does not recycle food waste is currently throwing the equivalent of £38 each month into the bin, so the campaign is aimed at getting these residents participating in the food waste collection service. Almost all dry food can be recycled — in East Dunbartonshire, it is then treated before being converted into energy. Kitchen caddies and bin liners are provided by the Council, the larger kerbside caddies lock to prevent smells, leaks and spillages and are emptied once a week.

Julie McNeill, who recycles the food waste produced by her family at their home in Bishopbriggs, said, "Recycling has made me more conscious about how much food we waste, and I'm now careful about only buying what my family needs.

I used to buy multi-packs because they were cheaper, but I ended up just throwing a lot of it into the bin.

"Food waste recycling couldn't be easier, the caddy only sits in the kitchen for a day or two before the bag goes outside, and it's then picked up once a week. It means that there aren't any smells from the main kitchen bin, which is now less full too. Recycling is also the right thing to do for environmental reasons."

Place agenda moves forward in Auchinairn

As a result the 'place approach' has been adopted – a way of working with communities to alleviate local issues with tailored solutions, making people central to the process.

The delivery of a state-ofthe-art community centre and nursery for Auchinairn is proposed as part of the 'place agenda' and the project recently moved a step forward after planning permission was granted. The new community facility will be built on the site of Auchinairn Primary School and will be a mixed use building for community groups with a café and a children's nursery. In the grounds of the development there will be a playground, car parking and landscaped gardens.

Subject to Council approval, the building of the new community centre and nursery can now be progressed for financial close.



News for blue badge holders

Drivers with a Blue Badge in East Dunbartonshire can park for free in town centre car parks – even where there are charges in place for others. As long as your Blue Badge is prominently displayed, you are exempt from displaying a ticket or paying charges in Council car parks.

Charges were previously introduced in seven car parks last July with the other 21 Council car parks remaining free to use. Depute Chief Executive – Place, Neighbourhood & Corporate Assets, Thomas Glen said, "Across the area, drivers with a Blue Badge can park free in all Council car parks whether they are in a Blue Badge bay or not. I hope this encourages more people to support our town centres and shop locally. It is worth remembering too that even in car parks where charges are applicable, the first two hours of parking are free for everyone but a ticket must be displayed."

Meanwhile, the Council's Community Safety Team has been cracking down on drivers misusing Blue Badges and seized seven badges which were being used fraudulently.

Officers inspected 62 Blue Badges over a two week crackdown where they had reason to query

Under the Disabled Persons' Parking Badges (Scotland) Act 2014 misuse of a Blue Badge includes where family or friends of a Blue Badge holder use the badge without that person being with them. It also includes displaying an out-of-date badge.

Thomas Glen said, "Blue badge bays make life so much easier for those who genuinely need them. It is a criminal offence to misuse a badge and can result in a £1000 fine, a criminal record and confiscation of the badge. Please know that we are checking and will

The winners of the 2016 Club, Coach and Volunteer Awards organised by East Dunbartonshire Leisure and Culture (EDLC) Trust are listed here:



The fantastic new facility also contains meeting rooms and social work facilities, new public toilets and an entire upgrade of the current accommodation. The on-site customer services team will make it easier for residents to access and get information about a variety of different Council services and make payments for them in just one visit.

Ann Davie, Depute Chief Executive — Education, People & Business, said, "This new Community Hub means the people of Bearsden will now be able to access a range of important services under one roof, on their doorstep. It provides easy access to information, advice and services in one central, modern and vibrant facility.

War memorials restored to former glory





War memorials in Kirkintilloch and Lennoxtown have been returned to their former glory, thanks to great partnership working between the Centenary **Memorials Restoration Fund** (CMRF) and East Dunbartonshire

The CMRF – which is administered by War Memorials Trust on behalf of Historic Environment Scotland and the Scottish Government – awarded nearly £90,000 of funding to the conservation and repair works with the Council contributing another £30,000.

Conservations revealed that both war memorials needed extensive repair works. At Kirkintilloch War Memorial this included cleaning and treating the six bronze plaques, repairing and repainting the four ironwork gates and re-pointing the whole memorial with lime mortar while the Campsie War Memorial needed cleaning and re-pointing, as well as repair work to its ironwork gates and stonework.

Gold leaf work has also been reinstated at Kirkintilloch so that the war memorial now closely resembles what it would have looked like when it was first unveiled in 1925.

As well as being conserved and repaired these historical structures now incorporate a very modern crime-fighting security system called SmartWater. All bronze work on both memorials is now coated with this new forensically traceable DNA liquid.

Frances Moreton, Director of War Memorials Trust, said, "The centenary of World War I has so far seen communities across Scotland take advantage of this special funding, to ensure their war memorials are in the best possible condition to mark the sacrifices of so many. The memorials at Kirkintilloch and Lennoxtown are impressive monuments and are now in a good state of repair. CMRF grants are still available so we would encourage communities to get in contact now if they are considering undertaking a war memorial project."

It is the second time war memorials in East Dunbartonshire have benefitted from the CMRF. In 2014, war memorials in Bearsden and Milngavie were conserved and repaired thanks to a £16,550 grant.

Crowning glory for Coronation Gardens



Dunbartonshire was awarded **Showcase Centenary Field 2016** status at the Fields in Trust

The site in Lenzie was one of only eight nationwide awarded the prestigious title by the Fields in Trust, and the only one from Scotland.

The Centenary Fields programme, launched in 2014, is part of an initiative run by the national charity, in partnership with Poppyscotland. It has worked across the UK to secure outdoor recreational spaces in perpetuity to

commemorate the World War One centenary and honour the memory of the millions of people who lost their lives during the conflict, by protecting them for the benefit of future generations.

Paul Curran, Strategic Lead - Neighbourhood Services, said, "The aim of the work we have carried out at Coronation Gardens is to provide a peaceful, attractive open space which is also wildlife friendly.

"The Gardens have a number of bedding areas, paths and seats and offer visitors a peaceful area for quiet reflection."

Colin Rennie, Manager, Fields in Trust Scotland, said, "I congratulate East Dunbartonshire Council for being the first local authority in Scotland to protect memorial spaces as Centenary Fields.

"Coronation Gardens in Lenzie provides an excellent showcase Centenary Field illustrating how this programme can mark the sacrifices made by so many in World War I whilst looking to the future through a living remembrance."

Work in Lenzie ranged from the creation of new herbaceous

borders and shrub beds to the planting of specimen trees. In 2014 one of the bedding sites was planted up as a poppy meadow as part of the Council's World War Commemorations.

A newly designed memorial sculpture depicting growing poppy flowers was created by lain Chalmers from Chainsaw Creations and an inscribed wooden bench has been installed and the existing walls, which extend around three sides of Coronation Gardens, were also upgraded.



West Balgrochan Marsh is blooming lovely

West Balgrochan Marsh is looking blooming marvellous thanks to great partnership working between the Council, Torrance Greenspace Group and help from some hard-working school pupils.

The Torrance Greenspace Group was awarded £1,000 from The Central Scotland Green Network Community Fund and used some of it commission a fantastic biodiversity totem pole which shows some of the plants and animals that can be found at the marsh.

The area is bursting with biodiversity and is a site of local conservation interest for both people and wildlife.

develop and implement the project.

Torrance Primary pupils also worked with the Council's Countryside Rangers to plant a wide variety of wildflowers suited to the wet conditions of the marsh including Ragged Robin, Devils-bit Scabious and Meadow Cranesbill.



These plants will provide nectar for many insects while some are food plants for butterfly caterpillars.

Karen Smith of Torrance Greenspace Group, said, "The Torrance Greenspace Group was delighted to have been awarded a grant from Central Scotland Green Network Trust to fund the wildflower planting and totem for the marsh.

"We aim to enhance the open spaces around the village by planting spring bulbs/ wildflowers, maintaining the planted containers, flowerbeds and nature corridors for the benefit and enjoyment of the local community."

Balgrochan Marsh improvements march on



Visitors to Balgrochan Marsh in Lennoxtown can now enjoy an improved experience, thanks to great partnership working between East Dunbartonshire Council and the Whitefield Pond Group.

Noted for its wide variety of wildlife ranging from the elusive Snipe to the equally shy Roe Deer, Balgrochan Marsh was in need of some conservation management.

The Council worked with Whitefield Pond Group to secure £23,281 towards this from WREN, a funding body for Landfill tax grants. The grant was used to improve Balgrochan Marsh — a site of local conservation interest — for both people and wildlife.

In addition to the funding secured, the Council's Streetscene Technical Support Team provided additional value by creating a raised path linking Geelong Gardens to the Crow Road Right of Way as well as installing a large sandstone monolith information point and boundary site marker stones.

Local school pupils also created a wildflower meadow at Geelong Gardens while small shallow pools suitable for amphibians and dragonflies will be created in the near future. Tree thinning will be carried out to keep the marsh a suitable habitat for the plants and animals found there.

Veronica Stewart, Secretary of the Whitefield Pond Group, said, "This has been an extremely rewarding project. It is great for local wildlife and fantastic for the community.

"We were delighted to take the opportunity to work in partnership with the Council to take steps to enhance Balgrochan Marsh. It will be a great gift to hand it on to future generations."
