Holocaust Memorial Day 2017 will be commemorated at a number of events in East **Dunbartonshire - including the** national ceremony for Scotland.


East Dunbartonshire Council is working in partnership with Interfaith Scotland to raise awareness of this year's theme: "How can life go on?"

Bishopbriggs Academy has been chosen as the venue for Scotland's Holocaust commemoration event on Thursday 26 January 2017 - the eve of Holocaust Memorial Day.

International speakers will include author Saskia Tepe, the daughter of a Holocaust survivor, and Umutesi Stewart, survivor of the Rwandan Genocide.

The evening will also include performances from young people from across East Dunbartonshire, the lighting of memorial candles, orchestral music and more.

Commemorations involving East Dunbartonshire schools are also taking place in Boclair Academy in Bearsden and St Ninian's High in Kirkintilloch on 24 January 2017.



Schools will be producing artwork and the Council is also working with the Learning Centre at HMP Low Moss.

Shoppers, revellers and businesses joined

Shoppers, revellers and businesses joined festive forces recently to support town and village centres in East Dunbartonshire.

Christmas lights were switched on in local communities, with people flocking to use shops, hostelries and services.

There was a Kirkintilloch Christmas fun day on 26 November, with live music and entertainment. Local resident Flo Cairney said, "I went down with the kids to see Santa at the Regent Centre and have to say they had a great time. Thanks to all involved for making three kids very happy."

Bishopbriggs town centre's Christmas lights switch-on took place on 24 November, with local school choirs performing and Santa's Grotto hosted in the library. Meanwhile, Celtic FC manager Brendan Rodgers helped to switch on the lights in Lennoxtown on 26 November tying in with a Christmas Fayre courtesy of Lennoxtown Primary School.

There was a St Andrew's Festival and Christmas Lights Switch-On in Milngavie on 3 December, while Bearsden traders organised a Christmas tree lights switch-on on 2 December.

In addition, Christmas lights were switched on in Haughhead, Torrance, Milton of Campsie and Lenzie. There was also a Yuletide celebration at Mugdock Country Park on Friday 25 November. This year's Christmas lights switch-on events were led by the community, with support from the Council to supply the festive lights, power supply, officer time and trees where appropriate. People are being urged to support their local town centres in the run-up to Christmas and beyond the festive period. It comes as efforts continue in East Dunbartonshire to ensure local town centres not only survive, but thrive.

The Council is developing strategies for Bearsden, Bishopbriggs and Milngavie town centres, with consultation taking place recently to inform the process.

Work is racing ahead to create a major new sports facility in Bishopbriggs - ushering in a new era of community participation and activity.

East Dunbartonshire Council is developing a sports hub at Huntershill, in partnership with the Leisure and Culture (EDLC) Trust.

The sports pavilion building comprising 10 changing rooms, recreation hall and more - was recently 'topped out' - with all steelwork, concrete roof deck and insulated roof cladding installed. Work is also forging ahead on a full-size, 3G all-weather sports pitch with floodlighting and fencing, as well as a six-lane running track. Plans also include three floodlit, all-weather tennis courts, an access road and associated parking.

In addition to capital funding from the Council - and EDLC Trust sportscotland has contributed £500,000. The development is due to be completed by spring 2017. The projected total cost of the project is estimated at £7.8million which includes creating the pavilion, sports pitch, tennis courts and athletics track, as well as dealing with buried contaminants on the site and drainage.

Work has taken place with Scottish Athletics, Tennis Scotland, local football clubs, athletics groups and rugby clubs on the new facility, which will encourage sporting activity in the community, as well as enhancing facilities for local performance and club-level athletes.

Stewart Harris, Chief Executive of sportscotland, said, "At sportscotland we know that working in partnership and identifying opportunities to join up our thinking and delivery is the best way to maximise resources and deliver a great outcome for sport.

"It is terrific to see that East Dunbartonshire Council and the Culture and Leisure Trust share that philosophy. Their consultations



with the governing bodies and the clubs who will be the key users of this ambitious development mean that it will meet the needs of the local community for many years to come. That's why we were delighted to invest £500,000 in delivering this fantastic community facility."

In addition to support from sportscotland, funding is coming from the Council's capital programme - which is funded differently and completely separate from the revenue budget, which pays for day-to-day services and is under significant pressure.

High praise for **Kirkintilloch** Care Service

Residents and carers from two Kirkintilloch support services are celebrating after they were awarded high marks by the Care Inspectorate.

Meiklehill Housing Support Service and the John Street House care home were both rated as Grade 5 (Very Good) - the second highest ranking for the quality of care and support which they provide, as well as for the quality of staffing.

Adults with a learning disability are given physical, emotional, intellectual and social support at the John Street facility. Meiklehill helps people to become independent, supports them so that they can use community resources and maintain local supports and friendships, and make use of and be part of the local community.

The Care Inspectorate's job is to regulate and inspect care, social work and children's services to ensure vulnerable people are safe, that the overall quality of services improves and people understand the standards they have a right to expect.

Commenting on the John Street



House report, a relative said, "I am fully aware of and greatly re-assured by the excellent quality of care provided to my family member by this service. All the staff involved are of the highest quality, providing commitment, efficiency and affectionate care."

James Hobson, interim Chief Officer for the HSCP, said, "Providing the best service possible, tailored to individual needs, is a priority for the Partnership and services like Meiklehill are the perfect example of this."



A Milngavie resident has been reunited with a precious gemstone from her wedding ring after receiving some diamond service from the Council.

Pamela Mathieson lost a diamond from her wedding ring while getting her finger caught when dropping off some cardboard in one of the Council's recycling banks at Tesco in Milngavie. After contacting the Council's customer call centre, the distraught mother-of-two was put in touch with the Waste Services Team who arranged for the Roads Team to uplift the recycling bank and empty its contents at the Mavis Recycling



Centre in Bishopbriggs.

There a team of volunteers began the slow process of working through the giant mound of paper and cardboard as they hunted for the gem.

After nearly an hour of searching they had almost given up hope but amazingly something suddenly caught the eye of one of the search team who spotted the diamond and plucked it from the mountain of recycling.

The team then contacted Pamela and the jewel was soon reunited with its ecstatic owner. Pamela said, "I was devastated and heartbroken but everyone really went out of their way to help me.

Winter is well on its way and East Dunbartonshire Council is once again urging residents to make sure that they are fully prepared.

On the road

Make sure your car is ready for • winter by carrying out some basic checks now. Ideally, get your car a winter service.

- Check the anti-freeze and oil levels
- Check lights are working
 Make sure your car has plenty of windscreen wash,
- to the right winter concentration, and wiper blades are working
- Check tyre treads they may save your life in poor conditions
- Get your brakes checked

Kit out your car wit

- A warm blanket
- Emergency food and drink
- A torch
- A shovel
- De-icer and scraper
- Tow rope
- Mobile phone charger

At Home

In the event of an emergency, the Council repairs service is available to tenants 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year freephone 0300 123 4510. If you're not a Council tenant, it's a good idea to have a telephone number for a plumber and electrician to hand: Prepare a home emergency kit, including: torch, radio and spare batteries; any essential medication; three days' supply of non-perishable food and bottled water; baby food; pet supplies; paper, pencil, penknife and whistle; and a list of emergency numbers;

- Follow Scottish Water's advice on protecting your pipes;
- Know where your stop valve is and how to turn off your water;
- If cold weather is forecast, and during a cold snap, keep your heating on at a low setting to help prevent pipes from freezing;
 - Know how to turn off your electricity supply at the mains;
 - In the event or a power cut or emergency, call 105 (see page 18 for more details); Look after your pets - don't leave them out in the cold for too long;
 - Ensure you have access to a shovel and salt/grit for clearing paths;

- Don't use hot water to clear ice or snow, either on your path or windscreen. It can turn quickly to ice and crack a windscreen or increase your chances of slipping. If you don't have grit or salt, sand or ash can also be used;
- If shovelling snow, think where you're going to put it so it doesn't block pavements or other people's paths.
 Look out for elderly neighbours and help them too if you can.

Health

- Make sure that you have enough prescriptions and over-the-counter medicines to last through the festive season;
- Check in advance when your GP surgery and local pharmacy will be closed;
- Check your home for hazards and avoid a trip to Accident and Emergency;
- Find out if you are entitled to a free flu jab, or ask your pharmacist how you can pay for one if you do not qualify.

Gritting

The Council's Roads Team is on standby 24 hours a day to respond to any gritting requirements. The Duty Officer checks a dedicated forecasting service for highways three times a day and makes a decision on what action is required.

There are three road sensors which give information on the current status of the road condition, road surface temperature and amount of residual salt. More than 400 grit bins are placed at strategic locations for public use. Additional grit is available from Broomhill Depot, Kilsyth Road, Kirkintilloch. This is a facility for members of the public to use, so please bring a shovel and container.

William Patrick Library proud to be purple for pancreatic cancer campaign

William Patrick Library in Kirkintilloch was bathed in purple light during November in aid of pancreatic cancer awareness.

The Council joined individuals and organisations across the UK who united as part of the Purple Lights for pancreatic cancer campaign. This was done to show support for people with pancreatic cancer and to remember those who have sadly died of the disease, whilst also raising awareness of a disease that suffers from a chronic lack of awareness and funding. Over 9000 people are diagnosed with pancreatic cancer each year. Sadly, only 5% of those diagnosed with pancreatic cancer survive five years or more, and despite being the UK's fifth biggest cancer killer, the disease receives just 1.6% of UK cancer research funding.

The Council organised for William Patrick Library to light up in support of this very worthy cause. The building was lit purple from 17 November, World Pancreatic Cancer Day, until the end of November which is Pancreatic Cancer Awareness month.

Gerry Cornes, Chief Executive of East Dunbartonshire Council, said, "We were delighted to identify this location to 'light up purple' in support of Pancreatic Cancer and to raise awareness of this worthwhile cause."

on the way for Bearsden and Bishopbriggs

Work is progressing well on the multi-million pound project to transform Bearsden Burgh Hall in to a new Community Hub for the town.

Construction of the new £3m community facility began in April and it is on target for completion in early 2017.

The project will soon focus on completion of the interior of the building which will include features such as: the Customer Service area; public meeting rooms; social work facilities; the library as well as enhancing the current hall facilities through a full refurbishment.

Community Hubs are an important part of the Council's long term vision for more efficient, customer focussed services. The aim is to bring services together in an exciting and innovative way to improve residents' experience of dealing with the Council. A special drop-in awareness event in October also gave local people a chance to find out more about what they can expect from the new Hub. More than 60 people went along.

Ann Davie, Depute Chief Executive of East Dunbartonshire Council, said, "The progress in the build has been remarkable and is testament to all the planning and hard work that continues to be put in by the Council and our partners.

"The development of the Community Hub along with the nearby Kilmardinny House will see nearly £6m of investment within Bearsden and is a key element of our commitment to supporting development within the area."

Council agreed on 22 December to move to the next steps for the Bishopbriggs Community Hub and War Memorial Hall projects.



The £1.1m internal refurbishment of the Bishopbriggs War Memorial Hall will begin in January. Once complete, library services will operate from the building as work begins on the £2m Hub development later in the year.

This will involve enhancing the current library facilities through a

full refurbishment and upgrade of the current accommodation.

The Community Hub will also contain a multi-purpose room for children's activities and reading groups, a computer learning suite, private rooms for confidential business and an enhanced heritage space which will incorporate the Thomas Muir Museum.

New meeting of Allander Champions Group

Community campaigners have been praised for their enthusiasm and patience as efforts continue to deliver multi-million pound investment in Bearsden.

The Allander Champions Group has been re-established and met in November, with a second meeting scheduled for December. The group was set up to enable key stakeholders to provide valuable input into the scope and future design of the new Allander Leisure Centre.

The Champions include East Dunbartonshire councillors, representatives from the main user groups and local community organisations, and officers from the Council and EDLC Trust.

The replacement project is scheduled to formally start in early 2021 with the allocated budget for the project having been increased by the Council from £18m to £25m. The Council's level of contribution has increased from £8m to £19m.

Thomas Glen, Depute Chief Executive - Place, Neighbourhood & Corporate Assets, said, "I am delighted that the Allander Champions Group has been re-established and want to thank everyone who attended the recent meeting. "The Council remains fully committed to the Allander Leisure Centre project - which is reflected in the additional £11m of investment within the capital programme. "This is on top of Bearsden Community Hub, the future Milngavie Community Hub, new primary school and rejuvenation of Kilmardinny House."

• Some very excited youngsters were given a sneak preview of the work going on in at the new £12.4m Thomas Muir Primary School and Cleddens Early Learning and Childcare Centre in Bishopbriggs. Children from the centre came on site to check on progress before they move in April 2017. The new school, opening in April 2017, will replace Auchinairn PS and Woodhill PS. A new badge and uniform have been agreed by the interim parent council.

- There's a similar timetable in Kirkintilloch for the new £8.7m Holy Trinity PS which will also open in April 2017 to replace St Agatha's and St Flannan's Primaries. The interim parent council have also agreed a badge and uniform design.
- The planning application for the new school in Bearsden to replace the town's St Andrew's PS and St Joseph's in Milngavie was approved by the Council's Planning Board on 20 December following extensive discussion with the school community on the design.

"By recycling your Christmas tree you are disposing of it in an environmentally friendly way. "Don't forget to recycle your Christmas cards too - these can be placed in the blue bin with paper and card."

Empire Medal for inspirational Nan

Nan Middleton has been honoured with a British Empire Medal (BEM) in recognition of her outstanding contribution to arts and crafts - and volunteering in Dunbartonshire.

Her amazing work has changed thousands of lives - providing people of all ages and abilities with new skills and chances to be creative.

Nan, from Milngavie, has spent nearly 40 years working in communities around East Dunbartonshire, founding the Creative Care charity in 1999.

In 2010, Nan and the charity set up home in Brackenbrae House - supported by the Council - and have never looked back.

Between 150 and 200 people attend Brackenbrae House every week, with an extensive programme for adults with special needs. Nan and Creative Care are famed for their magical skills with 3D decoupage - the art of layering paper to create a 3D effect. Classes are also held on beading, jewellery and embroidery.

HM Lord-Lieutenant of Dunbartonshire, Rear Admiral Michael Gregory OBE, presented Nan with her BEM (pictured above) at an Investiture in the Council headquarters in Kirkintilloch earlier this month. Mr Gregory praised her "phenomenal work" and highlighted the achievements of the "amazingly helpful" Creative Care. Nan - a mother of three and

Nan - a mother of three and grandmother of five - was joined at the Investiture by her loving family, as well as patrons and management of Brackenbrae House. She said, "I've had a smile on my face for months - ever since I got the phone call from the Palace. It's just absolutely wonderful.

"When people come to Brackenbrae House we want them to feel needed, wanted, loved and appreciated - and they do. "We've had the same management group for many years and they are wonderful. It's amazing to think there are no paid employees at Creative Care.

"I want to thank all my family and everyone at the charity for their support - I couldn't do this without you.

"I would also like to thank the Council for its support. As soon as we saw Brackenbrae House, it felt like home."

Creative Care received The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in 2013 - the highest award which can be given to volunteer groups across the UK.

Art at the heart of Kirkintilloch town centre

Inspirational works by local artists are being showcased at the heart of Kirkintilloch town centre.

A new wall has been created on the corner of Catherine Street and Cowgate - featuring a range of stone carvings by talented members of the local community.

The wall is a partnership between East Dunbartonshire Council's Kirkintilloch Masterplan team and the Leisure and Culture Trust's Trails & Tales programme.

Volunteers Barbara MacIntosh, Blair Findleton and Robin Ewart worked with artist Lucinda Wilkinson over a number of months to create a series of stone artworks reflecting the heritage of Kirkintilloch - such as the Strathkelvin Coat of Arms, a foundry worker and a lion's head.

Training was provided through the Trails & Tales programme, which established a stone-carving site in partnership with the Council at Kirkintilloch Marina.

The Seagull Trust kindly provided a temporary space for volunteers and artists to work. The outdoors activity ran one day a week for over 12 months. In addition, stone-carving taster sessions were provided as part of Kirkintilloch Canal Festival and Doors Open Day.

Cultural Co-ordinator Esmee Thompson said, "Well done to all the volunteers involved for their hard work in creating the stone carvings.

"The aim of the new wall - and the wider Trails & Tales programme - is to engage people in local stories and heritage, and inspire them to get creative."

Artist Robin Ewart said, "I was interested in sculpture anyway and then I saw an advert which contained the magic word 'free'.



Also the venue was almost on my doorstep. What's not to like?

"Not only is our teacher Lucinda Wilkinson a talented artist, but her good humour and patience saw us through many a wet day at the yard."

The opportunity was supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Creative Scotland. The hope is that more community and heritage-informed - public artworks can be used to enhance public spaces for Kirkintilloch and wider East Dunbartonshire. 

POWER CUT? CALL 105

Would you know who to phone to report a power cut or find out more about what's happening in your area during an outage?

Well, this is your chance to get on the ball and keep a handy note of the new number to ring. On 6th September a new national number was launched by all electricity network operators – it is 105. So now, Instead of trying to remember 0800 numbers you can simply call 105.

Here's what you need to know:

- When you dial 105 you will be put through to your local electricity network operator the company that manages the cables, power lines and substations that deliver electricity in your area.
- Ringing 105 is completely free and everyone can use it, regardless of who you buy your electricity from.
- Calling 105 is just one way to contact your electricity network operator. Check out their website for updates. Most are on social media too.
- You can also call 105 if you spot damage to electricity power lines and substations that could be dangerous. If there's a serious immediate risk, please call the emergency services too.

Bird's-eye view of Bishopbriggs project

Enjoy a bird's-eye view of ground-breaking work on Bishopbriggs Relief Road as work continues on the latest section.

That's the offer to people and businesses as the next phase of the road takes shape - paving the way for community and economic benefits. Video updates are now available on the Council's YouTube channel - www.youtube.com/user /EastDunCouncil

The Council-led project involves the creation of:

 A two-lane 50mph road stretching 600 metres between Wester Cleddens Roundabout and a new roundabout, with another 100 metres of road on the north side of the railway

- A new bridge over the main Edinburgh-Glasgow railway line
- Dedicated walking/cycling route and bridge
- A new access road into Cadder Yard
- Two Sustainable Urban Drainage ponds.

Once phase four is complete, the existing stretch of Westerhill Road and bridge will be used as an active travel corridor - becoming a haven for walking and cycling. The project is part of the Council's 10-year capital programme and is being part-funded through developers' contributions from the Bishopbriggs East housing development. The scheme has been designed and project managed by AECOM.

Morrison Construction is the contractor appointed by the Council, with a number of community benefits, including employment opportunities, a school placement programme with Bishopbriggs Academy and Turnbull High, and work/graduate placements.

The centrepiece of the £6.5m fourth phase is a new bridge over the railway line and the project team have liaised with Network Rail to fit in with the Edinburgh Glasgow Improvement Programme.

It is hoped the new stretch of road could be open as early as May 2017, with the entire project on track to be completed by 1 August.

Thomas Glen, Depute Chief Executive - Place, Neighbourhood & Corporate Assets, said, "I am delighted to say that work is forging ahead to deliver the fourth phase of Bishopbriggs Relief Road. "I would encourage everyone with access to the Internet to check out the Council's YouTube channel, where you can see monthly videos - shot from a drone overhead illustrating the scale and progress of the scheme.

"The new stretch of road will help to cut congestion, support new investment, improve air quality and encourage active travel.

"When phase four is finished, the existing Westerhill Road and bridge will become an active travel corridor for pedestrians and cyclists - linking north and south Bishopbriggs. It's going to be absolutely fantastic."
